Introduction

Social scientists study all aspects of human society, from the distribution of products and services to newly formed religious groups to plans for modern mass transportation systems. Social Science research provides insights that help us understand the many different ways in which individuals and groups make decisions, exercise power, or respond to change. Research is a basic activity for many social scientists. They use established or newly discovered methods to assemble a body of facts and theory that contributes to human knowledge. Applied research usually is designed to practice information that will enable people to make better decisions or manage their affairs more effectively. Interviews and surveys are widely used to collect facts, opinions, or other information. Some specialties within social science include education, criminology, demography, cultural traditions, family relations, social psychology, gerontology, social welfare, race relations, social status, and social change.
